A Tribute To Our Founder Doreen Green

26th March 1927-21st March 2016

Doreen Green was co-founder of The Magdalene Group, which was born out of the vision of two Norwich magistrates in 1992. With daughters of their own, they dealt frequently with young women brought before them charged with being "common prostitutes" and so breaking the law. They were moved by the women who had no support, little education and only knew of relationships which abused and used them. Often the only way these women had of paying their fines was to go back out on to the street. Driven by their Christian faith they set about establishing a support scheme in Norwich. The Group was registered as a charity in 1994 and thanks to a wide range of volunteers and benefactors the Charity celebrated its opening a few months later.

The Magdalene Group has grown and developed as new needs, threats and challenges have emerged and they contributed to the Home Office publication "Prostitute Review – Paying the Price".

This review cited The Magdalene Group as an example of best practice for its rehabilitation programme and in 2003 The Magdalene Group received the Queen's Golden Jubilee Award only three such awards were given in the East of England that year.

The work of The Magdalene Group has grown from strength to strength and has become the foremost provider of services for women and young people who experience sexual exploitation in Norfolk.

We were delighted to have Doreen at our recent away day in Feb 2016 where we shared exciting plans to remain innovative and responsive in continuing to meet the needs of the people who use our service. Doreen addressed the group and said that she could not be happier than where the Magdalene Group is today and what peace of mind she has with The Magdalene Group in the care of Suzi, Sara and the team – words that we will always treasure.

CEO Report

I am so proud that for over 20 years the Magdalene Group has unfailingly provided love and care to people experiencing sexual exploitation. To have the honour of leading the way forward in terms of the services and approaches we adopt in order to fulfil the original aims of our founder, Doreen Green, fills me with a strong sense of pride.

This year has seen a huge increase in demand for our services. The Rose Project has worked with over 203 young people and the Doorway Project has worked with over 104 women, however the numbers will never do justice to the often

harrowing and heart breaking stories of sexual exploitation underlying them. A huge acknowledgement and thanks to the dedication of the staff team, who need resilience and commitment in working to meet the needs of their clients being held to account, addressing safeguarding concerns, making many judgements and being responsive and adaptable in managing expectations.

Our services could not be delivered without the dedication from our trustees and volunteers and so it is with an enormous thank you to all who support the work of The Magdalene Group.

For sex workers, the charity provides the Doorway Project, a drop-in service where women share a hot meal and a rare sense of belonging, a street outreach service, prison visiting service and other support to exit the sex industry if they choose.

- Street Outreach A team making contact with women working in the red light district offering support, crisis intervention, sexual health, ugly mugs scheme and hot drinks.
- NETREACH Making contact with indoor sex workers through chat rooms, email and social media to offer information and guidance and support.
- Helpline/Live Chat 0808 800 1030
 Offering a listening service and information.
- Drop-in Access to computer suite, support with housing, finances, health or any other concerns. Hot lunch and chat.
- Support for asylum seekers and migrant women who have experienced trafficking or sexual exploitation.
- Prison Support Monthly visits to support women in prison, with the court process and to provide support on release.
- **Befriending** Regular meetings to help women attend appointments, meet for coffee and to manage their day to day lives.



"I've been doing this since I was 16...I've completely lost track of who I am. I wasn't addicted to drugs to begin with, that came later, and I've been stuck on a roundabout ever since.

I come here and, for a few hours, I get to be the person I used to be...I used to see a sign on the door saying they helped sex workers but it took me months to pluck up the courage to come in. I was scared of people looking down on me, but they're not like that, it makes a big difference to talk to people who understand.

The project's given me meals, clothes, access to computers, help with my housing benefit, health appointments and when my mum died they referred me for counselling, they were there for me when no-one else wanted to know; no-one.

If it wasn't for Doorway I'm not sure where I'd be, but I think I'd be in a bad place, mentally and physically. I don't want to be doing this, but I don't see any end in sight..."



From March 2015–February 2016 the Doorway project has worked with **104 women**.





The Rose Project supports young people by providing a range of services.

From March 2015–April 2016 **84 young people** have engaged in:

- Befriending
- Targeted support
- Therapeutic sessions

- School Support Delivered to young people in schools throughout Norfolk who are considered at a low risk of CSE helping them to understand 'risky behaviours' and how to stay safe from harm.
- ISVA Advanced programme supporting children and young people. Providing support to young people through the Criminal Justice System who have been affected by:
- instances of grooming
- online sexual activity
- incitement to commit sexual acts.
- Befriending Offers ongoing support and Targeted support works to agreed goals over a six week period. Helping young people who have been victims of CSE work through issues to help them stay safe in the future. Also offered to young people that are demonstrating risky or unsafe behaviours to prevent them becoming victims of CSE.
- Therapeutic Support Helps young people to reflect and understand their experience of sexual exploitation, through the telling of their story to understand what happened and how to move on from it.

- MASH (Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub) The MASH deals with all safeguarding concerns for children and vulnerable adults in Norfolk. The Rose Project is co-located there and works in partnership with Police and Children's Services to take new referrals for young people who run away or have been victims of CSE.

All young people missing from home or care are offered a return to home interview to:

- check if they came to any harm
- check for indicators or vulnerabilities that might suggest they have been victims of CSE
- enable signposting to other agencies for any additional support required
- highlight any safeguarding issues
- identify that they might have been a victim of crime

1571 children and young people in primary, secondary school and college impacted through 62 school work sessions.

20 courses delivered to **325 professionals** between March 2015–February 2016
